HAIRS LINK MAN, BOY TO CAVE DEATHS

Strands Found on 3 Victims

Evidence indicating that two persons—a middle aged man and a youth—were involved in the murders of three Riverside women was received by investigators Monday.



Eutsey The new theory was based on a report to Sheriff Ray Eutsey of La Salle county by technicians of the Eastman Kodak company laboratory at Rochester, N. Y.

Technicians of the laboratory said 18 strands of brown hair found clutched in the left hand of Mrs. Lillian Oetting, one of the three victims, apparently were from the head of a middle aged man.

Others From Boy's Head
They also noted that eight strands of hair found clinging to a glove worn by Mrs. Frances Murphy, 47, another of the victims, apparently were from the head of a teenager.

The other victim was Mrs. Mildred Lindquist, 50. Bodies of the three women were found March 16, two days after the slayings, in a cave of St. Louis canyon in Starved Rock state park.

Fiber Link Indicated

The Eastman technicians also reported that a small bit of red fiber found in the cave near the bodies apparently was orlon, a synthetic fabric. None of the murder victims, authorities said, wore any red orlon fabric. This led to a theory that the red fiber may have come from the killers.

Scores Jailed, 16 Are Injured in San Francisco

(From our San Francisco, May 13 file)—The hundred demonstrators, protesting against hearings by the House committee on un-American activities, battled police in City Hall Friday night, resulting in scores jailed and 16 injured.

A general riot first brought 80 to 100 policemen, some on foot and some on horseback, to the scene which had become a "brawl" of police, clubs and hoses.

Police said 60 demonstrators were arrested and 16 injured. The injured were taken to the hospital, three of whom suffered possible heart attacks.

Starved Rock Fingerprints Being Taken

OTTAWA, Ill. (AP) — Fingerprinting of up to 500 persons living in the area of Starved Rock State Park begins today in the latest phase in the hunt for the killers of three Chicago-area matrons.

Some men will be asked to provide hair samples as well. Employees of the park will be among the first printed.

The quarry now is believed to be two men, one of them middle-aged. This was deduced, Sheriff Ray Eutsey of La Salle County reported Monday, on the basis of strands of hair found clutched by two of the victims.

Earlier, it was theorized that one powerfully built man attacked and beat to death the three wives of Chicago business executives and then lugged their bodies into a cave in the year round recreation area.

Have Hair Strands

Eutsey said researchers from the laboratories of Eastman Kodak Co., Rochester, N.Y., informed him that 18 strands of brown hair were found in the left hand of Mrs. Lillian Oetting, 50, and eight strands of blond hair were discovered clinging to a glove worn by Mrs. Frances Murphy, 47. The hair samples came from males.

The other victim was Mrs. Mildred Lindquist, 50. All were from Riverside, Ill. They were slain March 14 shortly after setting out for a hike. Their bodies were found March 16.

Eutsey would not comment when asked about reports that one of the males was presumed to be a boy. But he said the brown hair came from a middle-aged man.

The mass fingerprinting will proceed at a rate of about 50 to 60 a day. Investigators of the Illinois Department of Criminal Identification hope to match a cluster of bloody prints found on the garments of two of the victims.

Strands of Hair Implicate Two In Park Slaying

STARVED ROCK STATE PARK
—(UPI)— Sheriff Ray Eutsey said Monday that two kinds of hair found at the death scene of three mothers indicate two persons were responsible for the triple slaying.

Eutsey said he had received a report by telephone that strands of hair found clutched in the hands of one of the victims and on the glove of another were human and from different persons.

FULL REPORT DUE

"Some of the hair found was about three times the thickness of normal hair," Eutsey said. "It was light colored but it cannot yet be determined the actual shade."

Eutsey received the report from technicians at Eastman Kodak Company laboratory at Rochester, N. Y. A full report was expected within the week.

He said he expected to receive pictures of the hair strands blown up to about the size of a "human wrist."
